# **Breakdown of LGBTQ Legislation/Critical Race Theory Bills**

#### 2023

20 Bills introduced on anti-LGBTQ+ topics - specifically transgender topics

5 lawmakers were responsible for 12 of these bills

60 bills were introduced or identified as a problem by the institutions they targeted

Roughly 2,000 transgender people residing in ND- Basic elements for trans youth quality of life were disproportionately targeted. Some lost the ability to stay on a youth sports team while others lost access to essential health care, or countless teens lost the ability simply to use the restroom of their choice.

#### 2021

ND HB 1508 Passed and Enrolled during 67th Legislative Assembly Special Session: Prohibiting the teaching of critical race theory in public schools; and to provide an effective date. (Representatives Kasper, Becker, B. Koppelman, Meier, Rohr, D. Ruby) (Senators Myrdal, Wanzek)

# **Breakdown of Transgender Medical Ban**

### What did the Medical Ban do? (HB 1254)

Criminalize Doctors for performing what is considered medically necessary care as determined by every major medical organization

### Who opposed the Medical Ban?

North Dakota's only two Pediatric Endocrinologists

Two hundred doctors and the North Dakota American Academy of Pediatricians

North Dakota Medical Association

Medical care, which is illegal to practice without a license, was voted on and passed by people with no medical background.

# **Breakdown of Transgender School Bills**

### **Impact of Trans-Specific Legislation**

- **Outing Youth** requires outing students to parents without any protection (1522)
- Restricting Restrooms impedes using restrooms safely in schools (1522)
- Sports Bans prevents transgender athletes from competing (1249/1489)

### Who opposed this legislation?


- Overruled the High School Activity Association Policy voted on in 2022
- School Psychologist Association, North Dakota Social Workers, ND United Teachers Union, Fargo Board of Education, Youth Works

Nobody leading our education, social work, or childcare sectors wanted or introduced these bills as problems to solve. Most opposed them vehemently.


# Medical and School Bills Relationship to Library Bans

Graphs below show the similarity in voting between Library Bans, Medical, and School Restrictions


692% chance that a lawmaker who votes against trans individuals would also vote against libraries

# 2023 Book Banning Bills

# SB 2123 Introduced by Sen. Beard

**1/23:** Relating to displaying objectionable materials or performance to minors; and to provide a penalty.

\*Combined SB 2123 with SB 2360 as an amendment adopted by the Senate Judiciary Committee without prior public notice during the first Senate Judiciary hearing for SB 2360.

# SB 2360 Introduced by Sens. Boehm, Beard, Hogue, Paulson, Wobbema, & Rep. Kasper

**1/23:** To create and enact a new section to chapter 12.1-27.1 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to required safety policies and technology protection measures; to amend and reenact (the North Dakota Century Code), relating to obscenity control; to provide a penalty; and to provide an effective date.

**2/14:** <u>Bill Hearing in Senate Judiciary.</u> Relating to required safety policies and technology protection measures; relating to obscenity control; to provide a penalty; and to provide an effective date.

-Amendment added list: **"Explicit sexual material"** means any written, pictorial, three-dimensional, or visual depiction that is patently offensive, including any photography, picture, or computer-generated image, showing or describing:

- -Human masturbation;
- -Deviant sexual intercourse;
- -Sexual intercourse;
- -Direct physical stimulation of genitals;

- -Sadomasochistic abuse;
- -Postpubertal human genitals;
- -Sexual activity;
- -Sexual perversion; or
- -Sex-based classifications.

**3/14:** <u>Bill Hearing in House Judiciary.</u> Relating to the definition of a public library and required safety policies and technology protection measures.

**3/29:** Committee work done by House Judiciary List removed, replaced with language similar to the Miller Test

- -Taken as a whole, appeals to the prurient interest of minors;
- -Is patently under prevailing standards in the adult community in North Dakota as a whole with respect to what is suitable material for minors; and
- -Taken as a whole, lacks serious literary, artistic, political, or scientific value for minors.

**4/10:** Committee work done by House Judiciary; **4/18:** Committee work done by House Appropriations; **4/19:** Committee work done by House Appropriations

**SB 2360** also had **3 different fiscal notes generated/attached.** 3/29, 3/30, and 4/17

4/20: Passed as amended by the House

4/21: Passed the Senate

4/24: Signed by Speaker, President, Sent to Governor

4/26: Vetoed by Governor Burgum

4/26: Senate overrode veto

4/27: Veto sustained in House

4/28: Filed with Secretary of State **FAILED** 

# HB 1205 Introduced by Rep. Lefor, Rep. Steiner

### 1/17: Bill hearing in House Judiciary.

Relating to prohibiting public libraries from maintaining sexually explicit books. The term means any pictorial, three-dimensional, or visual depiction, including any photography, picture, or computer-generated image showing:

- -Human masturbation;
- -Deviant sexual intercourse;
- -Sexual intercourse;
- -Direct physical stimulation of genitals;
- -Sadomasochistic abuse;
- -Postpubertal human genitals;
- -Sexual preferences;
- -Sexual activity;
- -Sexual perversion;
- -Sex-based classifications;
- -Sexual identity; or
- -Gender identity.

# **HB 1205 Final Bill Results**

3/13: Amendment by Senator Sickler removes the rest of the list, and changes language from "removal or disposal" to "relocation"

3/14: Committee work done by Senate Judiciary
3/29: Passed as amended in Senate
3/30: Returned to House, 20 CALENDAR DAYS PASS
4/20: Laid over one legislative day

3/30: Returned to House, 20 CALENDAR DAYS PASS 4/20: Laid over one legislative day 4/21: Passed in House 4/24: Signed by President

4/25: Signed by Speaker, Sent to Governor, **Signed** 4/26: Filed with Secretary of State

HB 1205 provides a definition for "explicit sexual material"- uses language consistent with the Miller Test

- -States "By January 1, 2024, each public library shall develop a policy and process for reviewing library collections to ensure conformance with the requirements of this section. The policy must include a procedure:
- a. For the removal or relocation of explicit sexual material in the public library;
- b. For the development of a book collection that is appropriate for the age and maturity levels of the individuals who may access the materials, and which is suitable for, and consistent with, the purpose of the library;
- c. For the public library to receive, evaluate, and respond to a request from an individual regarding the removal or relocation of one or more of the books or other materials in the library collection containing explicit sexual material; and
- d. To periodically review the library collection to ensure the library collection does not contain explicit sexual material in the children's collection.
- 4. Each public library shall provide a compliance report to the legislative management before May 1, 2024, on the implementation of collection development and relocation of materials policies as required by this section and to ensure sufficient compliance with this section."

# **Book Banning**

"Our parents made sure we grew up in a safe environment, without having to put up with sickness like this. It's our responsibility to make sure that public libraries (that) are not smart enough to figure out these books should not be made available to children, then we need to step in and take care of it. 
- -ALA's Office for Intellectual Freedom reported **695** attempts to censor library materials so far in 2023
- -Documented challenges include 1,915 unique titles
- -20% increase to unique titles from same period in 2022, the year with the HIGHEST number of challenges since ALA began tracking data 20 years ago
- -Most of the challenges were to books written by or about a person of color or a member of the LGBTQIA+ community.
- -As in 2022, 9 in 10 of the overall number of books challenged were part of an attempt to <u>censor multiple titles</u>.

The unparalleled number of reported book challenges in 2022 nearly doubles the 729 book challenges reported in 2021.

The number of books targeted is on the rise too, with over 2,500 unique titles included in challenges during 2022.







# **Collection Management**

#### II. COLLECTION MANAGEMENT POLICY (last update & approval January 19, 2023)

#### A. Purpos

This policy is a statement of principles by the Board of Trustees of the Minot Public Library. It serves as a guide for the Library staff in developing the collections of both print, non-print materials, and electronic resources. It provides the procedures for public objection to materials held and for suggestions for collection development.

The mission of the Minot Public Library is to be the center of information and exploration for the community. It is the duty of the Library to provide a wide range of materials with diversity of appeal and the representation of different points of view.

#### Intellectual Freedom

The Minot Public Library is committed to the principles of intellectual freedom and affirms the American Library Association's Freedom to Read statement [Appendix] and the Library Bill of Rights [Appendix]. As such, materials representing diverse viewpoints on topics, including controversial ones, are actively collected. Selection of an item does not indicate that the Library, its Board, or its Staff agrees with the ideas and viewpoints it presents.

#### Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion

The Minot Public Library is committed to develop collections that support an equitable and inclusive approach to the community. We affirm that considering the needs of under-resourced groups is integral to collection development and management. We recognize the linguistic and cultural diversity of the communities we serve. As we purchase more e-resources, we advocate for the institution to provide technological solutions that make possible inclusive community-wide services to ensure equitable collection access for all.

We commit to regularly assessing the adequacy of existing collections to ensure they are reflective of the diversity of the library's populations. We review demographic trends for our user communities to inform our work. We advocate for inclusive cataloging that improves equity in access to materials.

# Metadata

#### Author Name Change Policy\*\*

Anyone with materials in the UND Scholarly Commons may change the name displaying on the record and/or the materials themselves. While there are any number of reasons that someone may need to do this (including name changes related to gender, marriage, religion, and others), no justification is required for an author name change to be implemented. The change does not need to reflect the author's past or current legal name(s).

To have your name changed, email the Digital Initiatives Librarian (<u>zeineb,yousif@und.edu</u>) with the following information:

- 1. Name(s) currently listed on your materials in the UND Scholarly Commons
- 2. Complete list of materials with the old name on them, with a link to each item
- 3. The new name that you would like to be listed under

We will then change your name as requested on both the item record(s) and the document(s). There will be no mention of the previous name unless you specifically request that; if you want such a note, let us know what language to use. You are responsible for contacting your coauthors if you want them to know about the change.

# **Circulation**

#### RETURNING MATERIALS

Library materials are expected to be returned in good condition and may be returned in the library during open hours or in the book drops at any time. If a book drop is full, cardholders should NOT place items on the ground outside the book drop. Cardholders will be responsible for any damage or theft that might occur should any materials be deposited outside the library book drop.

#### FINES AND FEES

In order for Grand Forks Public, to most efficiently and effectively serve the community, library users are expected to return all borrowed materials in good condition and on time. No late fees will be assessed for overdue items. However, borrowers will be required to pay replacement costs for damaged, lost, or long-overdue items. Long-overdue items are those that

have been overdue for 30 days or more. All replacement charges will be waived if the items are returned

Late fees and fines for overdue interlibrary loan items are determined by the loaning library.

Borrowing privileges will be temporarily suspended when the fines owed to Grand Forks Public\_ reach \$15.01 or more. Borrowing may resume when materials are returned and fines are paid or reduced below the \$15.00 maximum.

Overdue notices are sent via email as a courtesy from Grand Forks Public\_. Failure to receive notices does not exempt cardholders from the responsibility of payment for damaged, lost or long-overdue library materials.

Library fees should be paid at the library facility. Cardholders may pay all or a portion of their fines and fees. A cardholder may be blocked if related family members' cards are blocked.

"This three hour DEI training covers five main areas that includes, background history/knowledge, microaggressions, cultural competency, unconscious bias and DEI in practice. There is an emphasis on the importance of inclusive language throughout the training. Each area has smaller workshops within that build upon one another. Each workshop allows for conversation and reflection, in hopes that participants can reflect on their written reflections a they asses their own DEI practices in the future. The learning outcomes of the training include: To begin understanding and valuing the importance of Diversity, equity and inclusion, to be able to practice diversity, equity and inclusion in our everyday lives, and to have an understanding of the vocabulary used in the training. Participants can range from teachers, to work professionals to public officials."

# Department of Education- Office of Civil Rights, Coordinator to take on Book Bans

### **Regulations Enforced by the Office for Civil Rights**

34 C.F.R. Part 100 Implementing Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, or national origin in all programs or activities that receive Federal financial assistance.

34 C.F.R. Part 104 Implementing Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability in all programs or activities that receive Federal financial assistance.

34 C.F.R. Part 106 Implementing Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of sex in all education programs or activities that receive Federal financial assistance.

34 C.F.R. Part 108 Implementing the Boy Scouts of America Equal Access Act of 2002, which prohibits certain entities that receive federal funds from the Department of Education from discriminating against certain designated youth groups that wish to meet at public schools.

34 C.F.R. Part 110 Implementing the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, which generally prohibits discrimination on the basis of age in all programs or activities that receive Federal financial assistance.

28 C.F.R. Part 35 Implementing Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability by public entities.

# **Strategies for Libraries**Ways You Can Act NOW

- Recruit LGBTQ2S+-friendly board members
- Make sure your libraries have sound policies addressing book banning.

  For example: Limit challengers to those residing in your community/patrons of the library
- Staff education/staff training about new censorship law
- Consider family/ gender neutral bathrooms in libraries
- Participate in outreach events supporting LGBTQ2S+ and BIPOC community members
- Resist the urge to avoid confrontation by self-censoring
- Please be sure to report challenges to ALA's Office of Intellectual Freedom ALA Challenge Reporting

# Things we can all do in our private lives and encourage others to do

- Attend local school board meetings/library board meetings/City Council or County Commission meetings
- Run for your Library Board or School Board!
- Run for political office! VOTE!
- Attend library programs
- Join a library support group (Friends of the Library)
- Hold local community educational events
- Write a letter to the editor
- Prepare and deliver public testimony if necessary
- Continue to voice support for libraries to your representatives

# **Talking Points for Libraries**

- Reading is a <u>foundational</u> skill, critical to future learning and to exercising our democratic freedoms.
- We can trust individuals to make their own decisions about what they read and believe.
- Parents have the right to guide their children's reading, but <u>parents should not be making decisions for other parents'</u> <u>children</u>. Specifically, a small group of parents should not dictate what books other people's children are allowed to read.
- Books are tools for understanding complex issues. <u>Limiting young people's access to books does not protect them from life's complex and challenging issues.</u>
- Young people deserve to see themselves reflected in a library's books.
- Removing and banning books from public libraries is a slippery slope to government censorship and the erosion of our country's commitment to freedom of expression.
- Please reject any efforts to ban books and <u>allow individuals and parents to make the decision about what they can</u> read and believe.
